house reception for the launch of her new Web site held at her VanAnden Street home in Auburn Sunday afternoon.

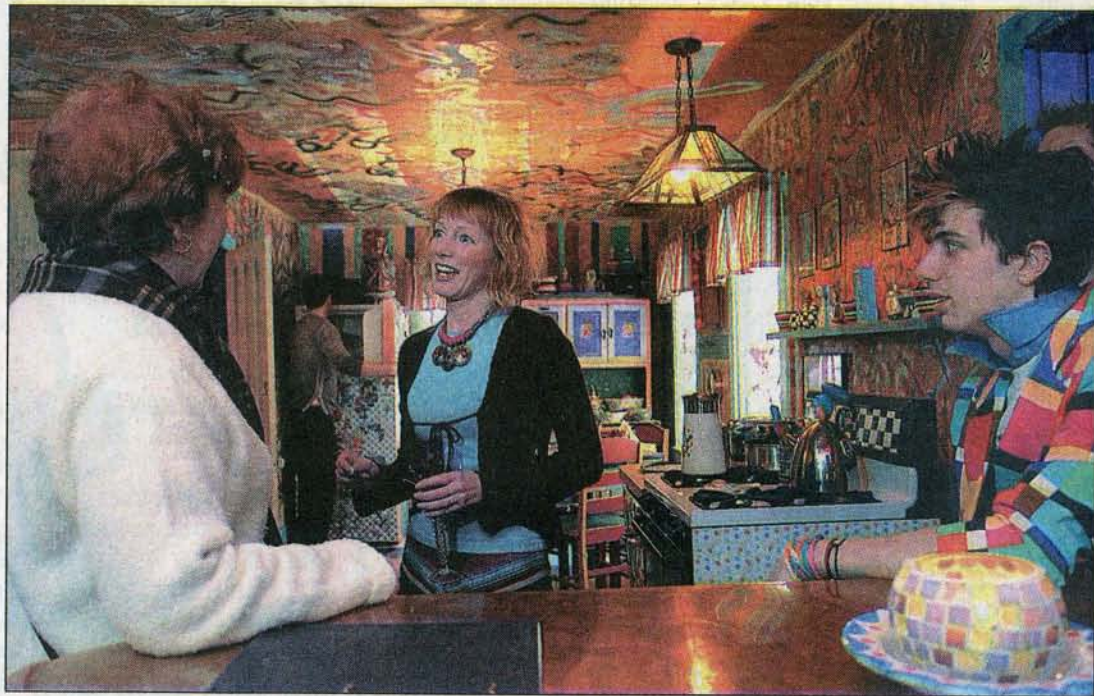
"My mother loved to use color wherever she could."

"I believe that everyone can

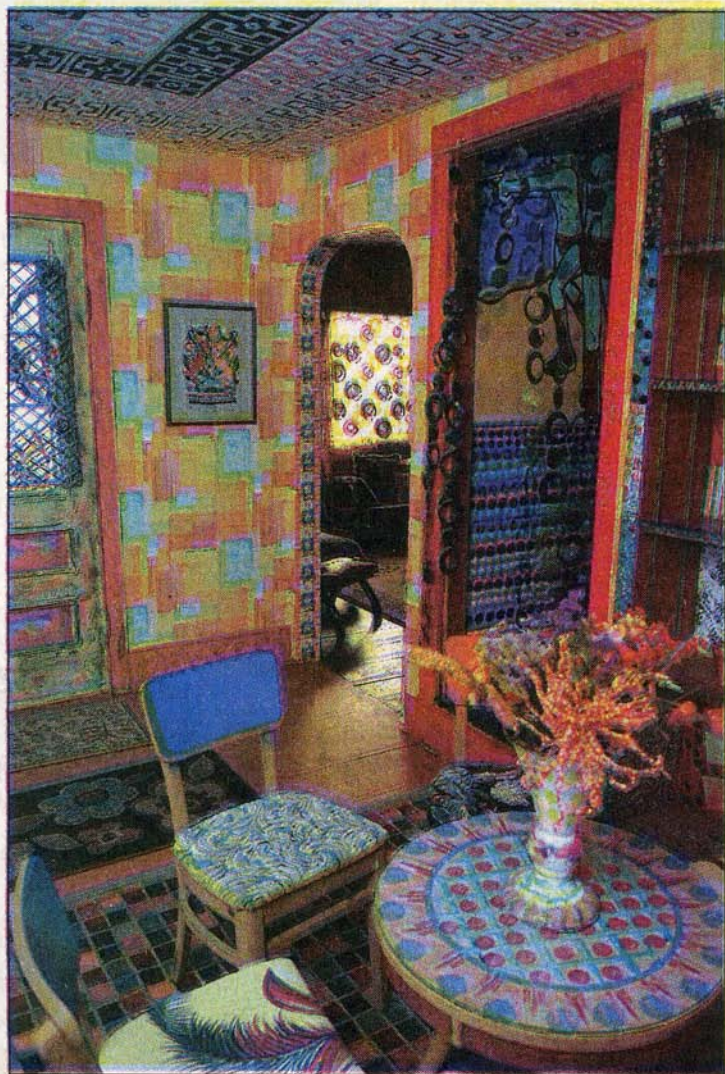

Kline said the first rule of decoration is to find an inspiration piece to work off from.

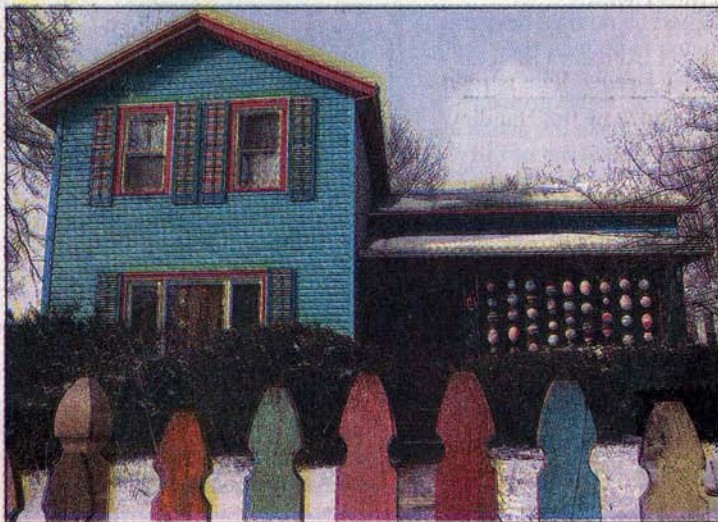
One of the kitchen walls in Kline's own home is a testament to this fact. The whole wall is covered in vacation souvenir stickers that her aunt had saved from the 1950s.
